Units to be Covered:

1. Review Unit – Revisiting important and complex material from Spanish 1
2. Tu día escolar – Schoolday; classroom items; extracurricular activities and school rules; stem-changing verbs; affirmative and negative words; making comparisons; the verbs *saber* and *conocer*; *hacer* + time expressions
3. Un evento especial – Daily routines; getting ready for a special event; shopping vocabulary; prices, money;

reflexive verbs; the verbs *ser, estar*; possessive adjectives *mío, tuyo*; the preterite of regular verbs; demonstrative adjectives

4. Tú y tu comunidad – Running errands; locations in a downtown; items purchased; places in a city or town; driving terms; modes of transportation; direct object pronouns; the irregular preterite of the verbs *ir, ser, hacer, tener, estar, poder*; irregular *tú* commands; present progressive irregular forms
5. Recuerdos del pasado – Toys; play terms; describing children; expressions describing etiquette; holiday and family celebrations; indirect object pronouns; the imperfect tense
6. Various grammatical topics – The imperfect tense and its uses; irregular preterite tenses; stem-changing preterite tenses; negative *tú* commands; *usted* and *ustedes* commands; the future tense; introduction to the *subjunctive*

Methods of Delivery: Oral presentation and teacher modeling, repetition and imitation, reading and speaking, class room discussion, notes, question and answer activities, simple sentence writing, games, role play, TPR activities, listening and reading comprehension activities, communicative activities

Planned Field Trips: Trip to a performance of a Hispanic music and dance Ensemble (tentative)
